Y9 Muhammed Hussain- works to the best of his ability without fail.


Geography and History

Performing arts - Drama

It has been so lovely to see many students improving their confidence and harnessing their love of performing this year, even during lockdown.

We have had some brilliant examples of work sent in from students of all year groups, demonstrating their research skills, vocal techniques including work on accent, diction and expression. Year 7 and 8 students have had their families involved in the Demon Barber play, recording new scenes each fortnight - it has really shown off some of our younger talent, well done! Year 9 students have been enjoying our new Digital Theatre Plus subscription, accessing professionally recorded versions of live theatre and I look forward to sharing these resources with all year groups on our return in September.

The Y11 Exam performance of Teechers by John Godber and the Y11 Level 2 RSL performance exams were a real highlight of the Drama calendar. The Y11 students really pulled out all the stops during these performances and were complemented at both events for their professionalism and excellent quality of acting skills and techniques demonstrated. The Drama Club has also been a highlight. Starting as a small group of students, they have looked at the Dennis Kelly play Our Teacher's a Troll. It's a different style of play which we hoped to perform to an audience this summer. Alas, we will have to wait a little bit longer... but it's exciting to have a project already in the pipeline to go back to.

Performing arts - Music

Teaching Music remotely during lockdown has been a very strange and quiet experience compared to our usual noisy existence at school! We can't wait for the time when we can perform together again.

Pupils have continued to work hard during the last few months with some fantastic pieces of work being sent in. Y10 have continued to work through their Unit 201ta coursework and several have been regularly attending the Google Meet lessons to analyse songs - it has been lovely seeing them. Y7-9 have been set a series of challenges for their home learning, ranging from Kahoot quizzes and song reviews to using the Chrome Music Lab to compose their own pieces of music or learning a piece for performance. Many pupils have risen to the challenge, and have developed their independence and resilience as a result. Several pupils have also made good use of the extra practice time they've had during lockdown and it has been lovely receiving videos of pupils making progress in their performing.

Mrs Maud has been sharing her Songs of the Day on the Music Department's Facebook and Instagram accounts, and the whole playlist is available on the Clifton Community School youtube channel. There is a broad variety of styles on there, secretly aimed at getting KS4 musicians to widen their listening for their RSL coursework.

There have been several highlights in the months before lockdown, including the Rotherham Music Service instrument demonstration to the whole of Y7 in the performance hall at the start of the year as part of Performing Arts Week and Clifton Choir performing in the WPT Christmas Concert at Magna in December. We've had Drumtastic, and took some Y10 and 11 pupils to perform at Riverside in support of the Creative Art Faculty's art show.

Performing arts - Music

Y10 pupils invited two Y4 classes from Badsley to watch them performing - the increase in confidence that our pupils got from this was amazing. Ilysha Jukes was even asked to perform her piano piece again so that one of the Y4s could sing it with her - a lovely moment that the little boy will remember forever.
